The greatest story ever told

A fitting summary of the story of the birth, life, death and resurrection of Jesus and its place within history. Like any good story it is always dependent upon the telling of it from one generation to the next.

In our last magazine I set out some of the challenging statistics facing our national church in terms of its declining membership and ministers. Paula Cameron, in her last 'Mission Matters' in her role as Mission Coordinator rightly pointed out that such figures were but just half of the story - the other half comes from the inspiring stories of new initiatives and projects which are happening around the country which in their own way look to 'turn the tide' of decline.

For four years Paula has helped us become more missional in our thinking and living and our thoughts and prayers are with her as she sets off on a new career and course of study and service. What stories of new initiatives and projects might we find amongst us here in Queensferry and Dalmeny?

Two in particular come to mind and over this month we would value your prayers as we look to build on the work of the last 4 years.

The first is the appointment of a Children and Family Worker, the advert for which has just been released. Funded fully by the Presbytery, this part-time post looks to develop, support and equip us all for our work of helping children and families discover for themselves the significance of the 'greatest story ever told'.



The second project is going to be the first stage in a 'Fresh Expressions' journey for us in Queensferry and Dalmeny and to support this we have applied to the 'Go for it' Fund of the Church of Scotland for half funding of £5,000.

We will then match this and hopefully over the rest of the year ahead we will engage both a consultant



in this field and ourselves in a process of discernment as to where God may be leading us. Over the years, which follow, we hope then to appoint a Fresh Expressions worker who will inspire and lead us in reaching out and into our growing communities with 'the greatest story ever told'.

And because God has no grand children, each new generation is invited to discover for themselves the meaning and significance of 'the greatest story ever told'.

Getting to know..... Laurie Brown

Well, where would we be without Laurie Brown? Need the sink unblocked, or a light bulb changed, or tables and chairs set out? Laurie Brown is your man. Beadle extraordinaire and general Mr Fixit, he performs a myriad of tasks for Queensferry Parish Church, many of them on a voluntary basis.

Laurie was born and brought up in Edinburgh. His first job was an apprenticeship in a shipping office, but since his teenage years, he had always had a great interest in ten-pin bowling and in the mechanics of it all. This led to employment, management then self-employment as a contractor in this industry. His job has taken him worldwide and he maintains a high profile in the bowling business, at one time being nominated for "World Technician of the Year".

He still works, mainly in Scotland "for as much as he needs", to help fund his other passions – cruising and ballroom dancing. On several occasions he has been a "dance host" on board ship. He recalls, with a wry smile, that on a "Strictly Come Dancing" cruise, he and Norma were awarded a 2 from Craig Revel Horwood. Well, he wasn't the first and won't be the last!! Natalie Lowe, one of the professional "Strictly" dancers however gave them a 7 and also danced an American swing with Laurie. Ah, happy



memories! No doubt you will also have seen him in his tuxedo on Ferry Fair day waltzing his way along the High Street and presenting red roses to lucky ladies in the crowds.

Laurie is a family man. With four children and four grandchildren, he is very much part of their lives and a very involved grandparent. "I'm lucky", he says, "My family are also my friends". He counts himself fortunate too in his marriage to Norma who in earlier years had to bring up the children often single-handed as Laurie was away from home so much. He is immensely proud of Norma's involvement in "Teddies for Tragedies" and hopes that the tremendous support from the knitters of Queensferry will continue to produce many more teddies, hats and blankets to enrich the lives of needy children in other countries.

For a number of years he was the organiser of the Blood Transfusion Service's day in Queensferry. Laurie himself has donated 114 pints of blood. Is this a record? "I could never have been a doctor, but this way, I still can save a life", he says. Laurie is a big man with a big heart. He sees himself as a "people person" and there are a fair number of folk in Queensferry who have been grateful for his support in times of tribulation. It might have been a two from Craig Revel Horwood, but it is a resounding ten from QPC.

Book Sale

In November 2001 Marion Gemmell decided to join a sponsored trek organised by Bethany Christian Trust to Cyprus, following in the steps of St Paul. At that time she and Robert had a large book case filled with a whole variety of books that needed to be disposed of so she arranged a fundraiser book sale, with tea, coffee and home baking. It was held at their home and managed to raise around £800. They lived in Queensferry but were attending Barnton Baptist Church at that time.

The book sale has continued over the years and so far it has raised somewhere around £7,000 - £8,000.

With this money the following have been helped:

Pastor Rajan Abraham. The Barnton Baptist Church financially

supported Rajan, at the time. The main thrust of his ministry was among slum and "untouchable" groups around Bhopal in India - folks who had no means of employment or health care. The money raised bought 30 sewing machines, allowing folks to become self-employed.

Support for Haiti after the earthquake. Money raised was used towards a refrigeration unit in a hospital that had been partially destroyed. One of the Barnton Elders, Dr Victor Jack, was one of the group of medical staff who visited and worked in Haiti as part of the project.

The Romanian charity Heart to Heart - supported by Lesley Cameron.

The initiative organised by Peter Freeland – providing medicines for a group in India.

Oversees Missionary Society – Project providing a home for abandoned babies in South Africa. Marion's brother-in-law has worked with this group over the past couple of decades.

Queensferry Churches Care in the Community.

Church of Scotland Project – providing homes for those caught up in the earthquake in Nepal.

Any books not purchased are taken to charity shops. On the last couple of occasions they have been delivered to Oxfam. Letters have been received from them to tell us that a further £1,500 has been raised through the sale of those books. The book sale is normally held around May or June. Marion and Robert now feel that age is just "ganging up against them" and encourage someone or even a group to continue with this worthy cause. If so, they would be delighted to give any help and encouragement.


NOMAD

Exploring the God Question

Only a few weeks ago we celebrated the birth of a baby, a baby predicted for centuries. An angel gave him his special name.

He was God incarnate. Really?! Why on earth would you believe it? Grasping the Nettle

Why we believe what we believe should be a question

of great interest to all believers. Does anyone really want to substitute a fiction for truth? Does God even exist – never mind the Christmas story - and is there evidence to support any of it? Many who reject God's existence do so in the belief that science has made him redundant and with that comes a supposition that the Christmas story itself is therefore wishful thinking and makebelieve. But what if the evidence from science points in a different direction? What if the more we discover about the wonders of our existence the more the handiwork of the Creator becomes apparent?

A couple of years ago church leaders from across the denominations in Scotland initiated a new movement, appropriately naming it Grasping the Nettle (GTN). GTN's objective is to promote an informed and respectful dialogue on the 'Science/God issue' and to transform the public understanding of the questions and assumptions at the heart of the Science/God debate. In addition to hosting conferences and events GTN actively encourages every congregation to make use of a professionally produced DVD series - Exploring the God Question (ETGQ). The series focuses on interviews with scientists and others on cosmology, life & evolution, and mind & consciousness. Some of the scientists interviewed are atheists while other interviewees hold a theistic worldview. ETGQ is ideal as a stimulus to group discussion. Indeed a small group connected with this congregation piloted the use of the material last spring. Following upon the success of the pilot we propose to offer the ETGQ series once more in the spring of 2017.


