The Word on the Street


In 2002 I became Minister of Dennistoun Baptist Church in Glasgow. The church had closed its large building and moved into smaller accommodation, and many folk didn't know where to find us. So we opened a Charity Shop on the main road as a way to meet local people. It worked! We encountered around 200 people each week and it also provided income for the church. That shop is still going strong.

In 2007 we started an emerging church project, or 'fresh expression'. With others who shared the vision we opened a shop in Dennistoun selling second-hand books and CDs, and offered good quality complementary tea and coffee to our visitors and customers. We called it 'The Word on the Street' - a play on words that reflected our books, but also that the Word was God. The shop was modern, airy and inviting, with comfy seating for people to sit and chat over coffee. And the people came! This gave us an opportunity to explain the ethos of the shop. We had decided that we would be a Christian outreach through our relationships, being good neighbours, and in the way we interacted with local folk.


We held a weekly worship service in the shop on Sundays. At first there were just eight people, mostly in their early twenties, but soon several others, with no previous church connection, joined us. We had a Baptism service in the shop, and another in Loch Lomond, and the church grew.

One memory that remains with me is a conversation one morning between myself, a Catholic Priest, a Church of Scotland Minister and a Buddhist theologian. We sat and drank coffee and did our best to answer the questions we all had about each other. Sadly the shop is no longer open, but we know that we had an impact both on ourselves, and on the lives of many people.

Focus on the Children's and Youth Ministry Team

"A team comprises a group of people linked in a common purpose. Teams are especially appropriate for conducting tasks that are high in complexity and have many interdependent subtasks."

I guess the Children's and Youth Ministry team can identify with that description! 'Team' in our case means a large and fluid group of people, and in fact is a 'team of teams'.

So ... what is the 'common purpose' that links us together? There are many possible descriptions, but one of the best is based on the Youth for Christ approach:

Demonstrate ... God's love

Declare ... relevantly the Good News about Jesus

Decision ... Give young people the opportunity to invite Jesus to be their saviour and friend **Disciple** ... Help young people to find out more about what it means to live as a Christian Everything that we do relates in some way to one or more of those 'Four Ds'.

What are we up to?

You'll have seen lots of activity and energy coming from our children's and youth ministry groups and activities recently. Whether it's our Fit for a King holiday club, or JC Kids and our teenage group YF re-starting after the summer; whether it's our Boys' and Girls' Brigade companies parading along the High Street with other uniformed organisations, Nomad playing cage football and sharing their faith with teenagers, or folk supporting SU groups in our schools; a group of dedicated folk willingly give up their time to run and support all these activities and more. Why? – because they want to see young people getting to know Jesus better, and to know that they are valued members of our church family. Also – it's great fun!



Where are we headed?

A couple of years ago, our elders set four top priorities for our '2020 Vision'. One of these was to develop a project to reach children, young people and families. Some of that is already in place, e.g. Fit for a King and Nomad. Some is still to come - perhaps a youth café, or support for families with pre-school children, or... And the exciting thing is that we are not doing this alone: we are working with other local churches, and with agencies like Youth for Christ and Care for the Family.

But there's one more definition of 'team':

"A group of people with a full set of complementary skills required to complete a task, job or project."

We don't think that describes us yet – so maybe you could help us complete the set?

Sacred Space

Every year the Church of Scotland offers its ministers two weeks Study Leave, which can be accrued for up to seven years. I have deferred study leave since coming to Queensferry and Dalmeny, and on 6 October I begin a period of leave to explore 'Sacred Space' through some time overseas, at a retreat centre near Perth and engaging with local folks such as architects, theologians and our own worship team. This has particular significance for us given the age and style of our church buildings and also the plans to launch 'Messy Church', which may in time find a home in a non-church building.

After four weeks leave, a week's holiday and a week back at church leading up to our remembrance day services, 'normal service' will resume on 17 November. Over this period I'm delighted to say that Rev Bob Gemmell and Mrs Fiona Devoy will provide pulpit cover and for pastoral cover our Associate Minister, Rev Alan Hamilton-Messer will be supported by the minister of Ratho Church of Scotland, Rev Ian Wells. As ever our Session Clerk, Guy Douglas, will be at the end of the phone or email.

Fabric Works

Many of you will recall we undertook major planned (and some emergency) works on the Church premises in 2014. Works have now been completed at the Church, Vennel Hall, and Manse premises.

At the Vennel Hall masonry repairs were needed at the mutual chimney and gable with the properties at Smith's Land. The Church's share of these works was approximately £2,500, including repairs to a crack that had opened up within the Hall. Other roof maintenance repairs were completed amounting to £650. At the Manse, emergency repairs to the front rainwater downpipe and drain that were fully blocked and cracked amounted to £1,100. The largest piece of work was the necessary stone repairs and re-pointing of the Church's main West elevation. We replaced damaged and missing protective glazing to the stained glass window. Internally rusting glazing restraint bars at gallery level had caused damage to the stonework and these were carefully cut out, the stone repaired and the bars re-instated after the damaged ends had been treated. These extensive works cost approximately £15,000 and along with roof maintenance repairs of a further £1,000 led to a significant overall expenditure on the fabric of our premises this year. Also, the St Andrew Hall was re-decorated and the notice boards refurbished. The above works have only been possible through the generous giving from the Congregation and we thank you all for your continuing support.

12th Global Bazaar



Since our first 'FairTrade Fair' during World Fairtrade Week in May 2004, the members of Queensferry Fair Trade Group have arranged a similar event at the end of October each year. The name changed to 'Global Bazaar' and a core group of stallholders -One World Shop, Hadeel, Tearcraft and Kwai River Crafts - heading up the seven stalls, has been supplemented with other stall holders to add variety to the bazaars.

On Saturday 25th October we will celebrate our 12th fair/bazaar from 10am - 3pm in Queensferry Parish Church Centre, admission £2 for adults, accompanied children free, refreshments included. This year will include a return visit by Comfort Rwanda and the Green Gift Company. Newcomer Gogo Olive joins us for the first time. As usual there will be an opportunity to taste tea and coffee from Equal Exchange before purchasing from the food stall.

Since 2004 the policy of the QFTG has been to offer free stalls to the visiting stallholders. However, the money raised through ticket sales supports fairtrade projects across the world. Look out for our beautiful poster, designed by Alister Bain, and come and enjoy this special event in October.

Mum and Dad had run out of food entirely, turned their heating off and were all sleeping in one bed with ice on the windows trying to stay warm! A tin of soup was used to feed little Tia, until an emergency food parcel was delivered to them.

The fourth follow-up activity is an Alpha Course for those who would like to discover more about Christianity in a relaxed environment. On Wed 8th October, an introductory evening will be held in Queensferry Rugby Club seeking to address the question: "Christianity – Boring, Untrue and Irrelevant?
