For the times, they are a-changing'

Yes, the announcement has been made that the man who was awarded a Nobel Peace Prize for Literature is 'lost for words'. We hope that this is not so, for Bob Dylan, singer-songwriter for many generations, so often was able to capture the mood and message of the hour. None more so when in 1963, at the heart of the liberated days of the 60's, he wrote the song "The times they are a-changin'." In the final verse, the words "As the present now, will later be past, the order is rapidly fadin'." Words for the 60's yet

words for today, particularly as you step back and look at the current situation facing our national Church. This may surprise you given the perspective we come from in Queensferry and Dalmeny, but recently, through my involvement with the General Assembly's Panel of Review and Reform, I have been presented with some shocking statistics which seem to indicate that the 'order is rapidly fadin"! Figures such as:



Ministers in 2005 - 1,032 Ministers in 2015 - 786

A 24% drop

With 76.5% of ministers over 50, more than half of them are due to retire within 5 years! "The times they are a-changin'."

As a Church of Scotland minister my workload and calling invites me to be involved not just at Congregational level but also across Edinburgh through the work of the Presbytery and nationally through the work of the General Assembly, in my case with the Panel of Review and Reform. For over three years now, in my work with the Presbytery, I have been journeying alongside the folks of Dean Parish Church as their Interim Moderator. On 20th November my season of service will come to an end, as the congregation will close. "The times they are a-changin'."

Challenging times across the Church in Scotland, across the Church in Edinburgh and also across Queensferry and Dalmeny.

In response to such challenging times, we in the leadership of the Church in Queensferry and Dalmeny have recognised that we dare not become complacent. Over the last few months we have been giving consideration to what we might do to build and grow the church in our area.

To this end, we are committing ourselves to exploring the appointment of a "Fresh Expressions" project worker, someone who will help us engage with folks who at present aren't engaging with the life of faith and church as they might. Our congregations are now well served with the recent appointment of Rev Graham Leitch as our Hon Associate Minister and our exceptional team of folks who lead us in worship week by week. So, because "the times they are a-changin'," we are looking to do all we can to ensure that with God – the best is yet to come!

Appointed Honorary Associate Minister in September 2016, Rev Graham Leitch "retired" in 2012, following parish ministries in Angus (5 years), in Barclay Church Edinburgh (23 years) and in three parishes - now Tyne Valley Parish Church, south of Dalkeith (9 years).




can come and enjoy and participate in worship whilst their young ones are being cared for in the safe and secure environment of the crèche. However, in order to be able to provide this service, we do need plenty of volunteers to join a proposed crèche rota. This is so that we can maximise the flexibility of the rota without overburdening any of the volunteers. Around 10 people have already come forward, which is great, but we ideally need more to create a large enough pool of people to draw from.

So if you, or anyone you know, would be able to spare a couple of hours on a Sunday morning on an occasional basis (perhaps once every 6 weeks or so), then please do get in touch (contact Huw Thomas email: huwandjanet@tiscali.co.uk). Safeguarding checks for potential volunteers working with children is a normal part of the process and will be undertaken for everyone before being able to join the rota. The safeguarding process is already underway for those who have so far come forward. Appropriate crèche training will also be offered to those volunteering.

Ideally, we would like to get the crèche up and running before Christmas but that of course depends on sufficient volunteers coming forward and to allow enough time for the safeguarding process to take place.



You Can Make a Difference to a Family Facing a Crisis With Safe Families for Children

Soon after Linda gave birth to twins, she felt like her world was falling apart. On discharge from hospital, she became poorly and was facing the prospect of being readmitted. Feeling unwell, she struggled to care for her two new-borns, and her 3-year-old son Ross couldn't understand why he no longer had his mum's undivided attention. Linda's husband worked from home, but the chaos in the house also began affecting his job. With no friends or family in the area, Linda had no one to turn to.

We paired Linda with two Family Friends who visited periodically to help with household chores, play with the 3 year old, help mum feed the twins, and reassure her when



she felt exhausted and overwhelmed. One of our Host Homes who lived nearby offered support too and discovered that their child went to the same nursery as Linda's son. The Host Home arranged play dates and helped take Ross to and from nursery, giving him a fun outing to look forward to and rest away from the stresses at home.

After two months, Linda was able to manage caring for the twins on her own so the Family Friends stopped visiting, but the play dates with Ross and his new friend look like they will continue.

Safe Families for Children empowers local churches to care for families like Linda's. By training and supporting church members, we equip the body of Christ to reach out to families in crisis.

On behalf of the volunteers Janet Thomas said the volunteers were delighted to have been able to make a real difference to Queensferry.



Not only did it leave them with a great deal of satisfaction that they were able to help our community, but it was great fun! I'd recommend it to anyone. Some of the worst areas were beside the Road Bridge junctions – where thoughtless drivers had thrown litter from their cars. Over the past few years Queensferry Parish Church has organised 5 Clean Up events which have now cleared over 130 bags full of rubbish from Queensferry.
